Read the following examples carefully:

- 1. Hunter Valley is the oldest coal manufacturing region of New South Wales.
- 2. Under the Bed.

The group of words in example-1 makes complete sense. Hence it is a sentence.

The group of words in example-2 does not make complete sense. Hence it is a phrase.

Sentence definition: A group of words that makes complete sense is called a sentence. A sentence always beings with a <u>capital letter</u> and often ends with a <u>full stop</u> (.)

Example -Egypt is a large country located in north-east Africa.

Phrase Definition: A group of words that makes sense but not complete sense is called a phrase.

Example - Surrounded by water.

Kinds of Sentences for kids

- 4 kinds of sentences for kids
 - 1. Sentences Assertive/Declarative sentence
 - 2. Interrogative sentence
 - 3. Imperative sentence
 - 4. Exclamatory sentence

Assertive/Declarative sentence

A sentence that states or declares something is called an **Assertive** or **Declarative Sentence**.

5 Examples of a declarative sentence

- 1. There is a huge swimming pool at my school.
- 2. My father gave me a set of Noddy's comics.
- 3. Riya and Priya love to watch the Discovery channel.

- 4. Seema hosts several sporting events in football and cricket.
- 5. Priyanka went to Mumbai.

Interrogative sentence

A sentence in which a question is asked is called an **Interrogative sentence**. It always ends with a question mark (?)

5 Examples of Interrogative sentence

- 1. How far is the airport from the railway station?
- 2. What are the ingredients of this dish?
- 3. Why are you playing with them?
- 4. Is this your book?
- 5. From where are you coming?

Imperative Sentence

A sentence through which an order is given or a request is made or a suggestion or advice is given called an **Imperative sentence**.

5 Examples of an imperative sentence:

- 1. May I borrow your notebook for a day?
- 2. Throw the garbage in the dustbin.
- 3. open the door immediately.
- 4. Could you do it for me?
- 5. Always help others.

Exclamatory Sentence

A sentence that expresses the feeling of joy, sorrow, surprise, wonder, applause or contempt is called an **Exclamatory Sentence**.

5 Examples of Exclamatory Sentence:

- How cold it is today!
- 2. Oh! we lose it.
- 3. What a pleasant day!
- 4. I got concert tickets!
- 5. Fantastic, let's go!
